#### **Berwick**

Named after Viscount Palmerston, a British Prime Minister who died in 1865 in office. He is credited with ending the Crimean War in 1855 and was known for his support for Catholic emancipation and parliamentary reform.

After Thomas Bruce, 7<sup>th</sup> Lord of Elgin (1766-1841) who is infamous for his trip to Greece in 1806 and his return to England with a collection of marble statues taken from the Parthenon and now known as Elgin's marbles. He purchased the art works from the Turks who then ruled Greece and controversy still abounds about their rightful owners.

#### **Berwick**

James and Jane Funston and their infant daughter Mary arrived as Assisted Immigrants aboard the *Persia* in July 1857. Mary had been born aboard ship less than a month before the young family's arrival. The next 5 children were born in the Geelong to Sunbury area, while their last 3 children were born in Berwick. The family were well known in the area for their involvement with the Church of Christ, and as Trustees of the Berwick Cemetery.


### BOER WAR PHOTOS

If you think you have an ancestor who participated in the BOER WAR 1899-1902, go to the Sth African section of the State Library Genealogy Room (ask at the desk) and find the book "Records of Australian Contingents to the War in Sth Africa 1899-1902" Call No. G. 968.048 OF3M. This book is not indexed and cannot be photocopied.

Look through each contingent to find the name and date of departure of the contingent your Ancestor is in. Then go to the Newspaper Room at the Library and get the film for the month and year of 'THE LEADER' Melbourne.

The Leader printed photos of most of the men who went to Sth Africa in 1899, 1901, and 1902. There is a list of names so that you can match the number of the name with the number printed on the photo.

## **A Timely Reminder!**

### **From Lynne Bradley**

We all have days when we feel decidedly older than usual. I was at the tail end of one such day when I sat down quietly to peruse the 'in box' in the hope of finding something that might lift my spirits – even just a little bit. Sadly, there wasn't much on offer, but amongst all the rubbish there was one little message from a chap who said that he's just put up a website that has 103,445 individuals from the Border Counties of Scotland. I have ancestors from Peeblesshire, so I followed the links and searched for mine. Interestingly, I found my lot of Andersons on his website but even more interesting was the fact that I found myself amongst them too. Golly Gee (sanitized version) I thought, no wonder I'm so tired and cranky today – I have every right to be. According to this I'm 302 years old and the mother of my ggggg Grandfather! Miracles aside, I think this gives anyone the right to be a bit tired and cranky.

Needless to say, this kept me wondering how it all came to be but I think I've pieced the puzzle together. Further investigation of the family groups revealed the same piece of misinformation that had been the basis of quite a few discussions between me and another gentleman that I had met on the internet. A few years ago we swapped some family information. Luckily, I had removed all living people except myself from this information before I passed it on. This gentleman would have me believe that a father and son both named James Anderson both married women named Jean Young. This is the one point where we disagree, so hence the information used on this website, had come from me to this gentleman, who in turn has passed it on the chap who has built the website.

Now, I know I should probably email this chap and tell him, but to be honest, in a weird way I find it all just a bit funny. I am sure there was no malice intended here, it's just one of those things that happens with family trees. We've all found a person who has married or died before they were born in our databases at times. But it does raise two really important issues and gives me the opportunity of personal experience to remind everyone again.

The first issue here is that you can't believe everything you see on the Internet. Yes, most certainly use the information as a sign post to point you in the right direction but you must evaluate this information against the source to check it's authenticity. An experienced family history researcher would probably realise that 'Lynne Bradley' is not a name that would be found in the middle of Peeblesshire, Scotland in the early 1700s – but what about those just starting out?

The second issue is perhaps the more important of the two, be very careful about what information you give to whom. You have absolutely no control over that information once you hand it over. And of course, your information might be passed from one researcher to another like mine was without your consent or even knowing about it. Please be very careful to remove details of those still living unless you have their express permission to include this information. Frighteningly, again and again, I have been given the most intimate details of living people from other researchers that I have 'met' over the Internet. These trusting people have no real idea of who I am or what I might do with this information. Luckily for them I have no ulterior motive. But what about the people you're dealing with? Can you say the same?

## ~ Ten simple steps to take a great Headstone photograph! ~

From the desk of Pam Lowther (If you missed Pam's sensational photos of Harkaway cemetery at our 15<sup>th</sup> birthday celebrations, make sure you see them soon!)

This is the headstone of a family member who you have been searching for.

You have travelled a long way to see this headstone and want to take a photograph of it and then send it to the rest of the family.

You want it to look really good so they think you are a great photographer.

**If you follow these ten simple steps, you and the photo will look brilliant!**

1. Get close to the headstone
2. Fill the viewfinder with the subject
3. Don't cut off any part of the headstone
4. Have the sun behind you
5. Don't cast a shadow on the headstone
6. Square it up in the viewfinder
7. Line your camera up with the approximate center of the headstone (so that you are not looking up or down at it)
8. Take the photo from straight in front of the subject (not at an angle)
9. Try to get as little of the irrelevant surroundings in the shot as possible




Tip: *If you can't take the photo with the sun behind you, it is possible to use your camera's flash to help light the headstone and counteract the shadow*


10. If the headstone is taller than wide, turn your camera sideways

*In the normal position, your camera takes a photo that is wider than tall or landscape.*

*When you turn your camera on its side it will take a photo that is taller than wide or portrait*
