## THE ORIGIN OF MOTHER'S DAY

Mother's Day celebrations can be traced as far back as ancient Greek and Roman times. The Greeks had a spring festival in honour of Rhea, wife of Cronus and the Mother of the Gods and Goddesses. The Romans held a three day religious celebration known as Hilaria and dedicated to Cybele, another mother goddess. It is thought that this ceremony for Cybele was adopted by the early church to honour the Mother of Christ. A custom developed from this whereby people were expected to visit the church of their baptism on this day.

### England's Mothering Sunday

Mothering Sunday was celebrated in England in the 1600's it was held on the 4<sup>th</sup> Sunday of Lent, to honour the mothers of England. As Christianity spread throughout Europe the celebration changed to honour the "Mother Church", Eventually the church festival was combined with Mothering Sunday celebrations and people began to honour their mothers as well as the church.

At this time many of England's poor worked as servants for the wealthy and their jobs were located quite a distance from their homes and they would have to live in the homes of their employers. On Mothering Sundays the servants were given the day off to visit their mothers. A mothering cake was made to help make the occasion more festive. Sometimes furrnety was served, this consists of wheat grains boiled in sweet milk, sugared and spiced.

In the north of England and Scotland people preferred to eat carlings – pancakes made of steeped pease fried in butter, with pepper and salt. In some locations Mothering Sunday became known as Carling Sunday.

### AMERICAN MOTHER'S DAY

Mother's Day started 150 years ago in the United States. In 1858 a young Appalachian homemaker named Anna Jarvis attempted to improve sanitation through what she called Mothers' Work Days. She did this by organising women especially mothers throughout the Civil War to work for better sanitary conditions for both sides. She began work in 1868 to reconcile Union and Confederate neighbours.

Anna Jarvis had a daughter also named Anna Jarvis. After her mothers' death the second Anna started her own campaign to found a memorial day for women. On May 10 1908 the first Mother's Day was celebrated in Grafton, West Virginia. Grafton is the home of the International Mother's Day Shrine. Eventually the celebrating of Mother's Day spread to 45 States. In 1914 President Woodrow Wilson, declared the first national Mother's Day.



## WE VISITED A GHOST TOWN

While on holidays, my husband John and I visited Port Albert. The oldest port in Gippsland, it is a lovely area and very historic. It became the port of entry for many settlers from NSW and Tasmania. Some of these were John's ancestors, hence our visit. One thing not to miss during a visit is the old bank building, now one of the best maritime museums in the state. Good reference material can be found, including lots of info about John's family. I had a great time. Of course the cemetery, one of the oldest and most significant in Victoria is also a must-see, not to mention the Fish and Chip shop, (dee-licious!).

Lots of our rellies lived and died in a place called Tarraville so we decided to visit as it's still marked on the map. It's only five minutes away, but the time we went the bridge was being repaired and we had to detour. We had fun finding this place. The sign said Tarraville, and there was a plaque on the side of the road saying there had been a Catholic Church. We stopped, walked around and scratched our heads. We drove down a bit of a dirt road with nothing but paddocks around and to our surprise, there in the middle of nowhere was the most beautiful little church. In the paddock next to the church was a big sign saying "Tarraville Historic Township". Tarraville came into existence in 1843 when Reeve's special survey was granted for eight square miles to the east of the Tarra River. Reeve advertised in the "Port Phillip" that 15 farms of 50 acres were available for lease over a period of five years for five pounds per annum. Reeve also laid out a township "Tarasdale /Taravale" between Reeve and Raymond Streets. The Government laid out the township of Tarraville on the southern boundary of Reeve's survey and this was gazetted in 1852, and Tarraville was officially declared a township in 1861. Teamsters, drovers and shippers of stock preferred to remain in Tarraville because of the lack of fresh water and pastures at Port Albert. Good water was available from Tarra Rivulet and shallow wells. Tarraville soon became the commercial and culture centre of Gippsland. In 1844 it was reported that Tarraville consisted of "a good brick inn together with fifty other buildings principally of brick". Like Port Albert, it reached its peak in the 1850's and early 1860's as a result of the activity in Gippsland associated with the discovery of gold. By the 1890's Tarraville was virtually a ghost town with Yarram the local centre. Today, all that remains of old Tarraville are Christ Church (pictured left), the School No. 615 built in 1877, the Commercial Hotel (now a private residence) and the ruins of Thomas Hanaghan Smith's residence/bakery built in 1851. Some dozen 'new' houses are nearby; a far cry from the Shire Offices, a Police station, 5 Hotels, 4 Churches and 39 businesses and numerous residences of its heyday. A sign read "Walk around Historic Tarraville and try to imagine it as it was between 1850 and 1860". In the middle of this sign was a map showing all the businesses etc.

We were very interested in this little part of the Country. I hoped there might be some others out there that had some Ancestors or Ghosts from this area in Gippsland.

## Melbourne's Unemployed in the 1890s.

Many people are familiar with the 'Marvellous Melbourne' land boom of the 1880s, but few know of the depression that followed. Melbourne's boom attracted workers from other states and from overseas, who came to seek their fortune, just as gold seekers had in the 1850s. South Australian building workers fled the poor economic conditions that prevailed there after years of devastating drought that caused hardship as early as the 1870s. Workers from Tasmania and New South Wales also sought work in the metropolis. Melbourne's land boom was built on speculation and was doomed to end suddenly and spectacularly as a result. Work was hard to obtain and by winter 1892 many men had been barely surviving on casual work. That winter was particularly cold and wet and the unemployed increased their agitation for work after the Government ceased spending on Public Works programs that for many was the one thing that held starvation at bay. In 1893 a run on the banks by scared investors led to the great bank crash. In this period Western Australia was developing and many workers fled there but many returned home when newspapers wrongly forecast an improvement in the job situation. These extra workers exacerbated and prolonged the depression, and many of the people from interstate were too poor to return home to family and friends. A new site lists some of the 9,000 men who registered with the newly formed Labour Bureau during June and July 1892. An ongoing project, the site will be updated regularly so bookmark it for future reference.

It was usually Easter Monday though and you would wake up to the rain belting down and have to pack up the tent in the rain. Great fun.

Also by the time you are reading this, hopefully I will be on the road with my sister, so I will not be at the general meeting in May. We are going to Adelaide and over to Burra, Kapunda and Koorunga where our great-grandfather James Patrick Casey and our great-grandmother Emily Quinn were married. After that we will go on to Broken Hill where a lot of the Casey family moved to - apparently around the Silverton area. They were miners of course and Dot and I would like to see where James Patrick Casey's brothers and sisters lived. A lot of research has been done by someone else on a Jeremiah Darby Casey, who we think could be a brother to James, so we will go to the Museum at Silverton and have a look there. Also there are the cemeteries to explore. James Patrick Casey and Emily Quinn, my great grandparents ended up in Williamstown where I was born, but that is another story.

The usual magazines have come in. *Ancestor*, which is always a good read; *Tasmanian Ancestry*, *Irish Roots*, *The SA Genealogist*, *The Genealogist*. Speaking of *The Genealogist*, it mentions that the AIGS now has in their library material covering Convicts before they came to Australia. Hulk Registers of Chatham, Woolwich, Portsmouth 1802-1849. Also in the March issue, is an article on Tracing Greek Australians in the National Archives of Australia. This would be interesting reading for someone with a Greek relative in their family tree as one of the new additions to our library is **Passport: a History of Greek Migration**.

Something I did want to mention is that you can borrow the CD's that come with the English magazines from 2004 on. Just ask for them when you borrow the magazine.

My husband Terry was very interested in the book **Waranga Shire** as his uncle had a farm at Stanhope which was in Waranga Shire, and he (Terry) spent his school holidays up there. He can remember going by train to Murchison East and then by a 1926 Albion bus (which was painted with red and white stripes for identification) to Rushworth and the last bit of the trip was in a 1939, 9 seater American Plymouth car (black with yellow stripes) and that was affectionately known as "The Tiger". Another unique factor of these two vehicles is that they ran on railway lines and Terry said it looked quite odd having no steering wheel. He can also remember that there was a Post Office not far from his Uncle's farm at another farm called Carag Carag and he used to ride his bike over to collect the mail. The Post Office is mentioned in the book. Sadly there was little trace of the Post Office left when we went up that way some years ago. Also in the book **Castlemaine: A Golden Harvest** there is mention of a Vivian's foundry and we wonder if these Vivian's were related. (Something for me to follow up in another life when I have the time).

If you are looking for a book or article on a particular subject it is quite easy to look it up in the catalogue. On the search page there are six or so different lines where you could type in your query. For example, if you were looking for Swan Hill, type it in the subject line. If you were looking for Kooweerup's potato festival, also type that in the subject line. Type in Ballarat in the Title line and you come up with different books and magazines that are related to Ballarat. If you are unsure ask someone else to show you how.

A very big thanks to Heather Arnold, the Local History Officer, for the donation of many of the histories listed. Thanks also to Marjorie Dean and Val Holland for books that they donated. It is very much appreciated. That's all this time. I hope I have inspired you to make use of your library a lot more.

Joan's extensive research includes work on the Millbank prison exiles, and specifically Herbert Swindells who became a pillar of society in Geelong.

### SAVE OUR CENSUS!

The next Australian census will be conducted on the night of Tuesday 8th August. It will contain 61 questions, of which all will be compulsory except the ones on religion and census retention.

The retention question (Q60) reads:

"Does each person in this household agree to his/her name and address and other information on this form being kept by the National Archives of Australia and then made publicly available after 99 years?"

**If this question is ignored, it will be treated as a NO and your form will be not be retained in the archives.**

The Census Information Legislation Amendment Bill (2005) ensures that name identified information collected in all future Australian censuses will be preserved for future genealogical and other research where households provide explicit consent on the census form. On the 2001 census 51 percent of Australian's answered "YES" to the retention of their forms. This was in effect a national referendum of the Australian people and a majority voted that our history matters.

Please encourage your family and friends to answer YES to Question 61 on census night.

#### DEATH OF MR. J. STARTUP

It was with universal expressions of regret throughout the whole district and shire that the intimation was received that Mr. Startup had passed to his rest on the evening of Tuesday, the 6<sup>th</sup> inst. Mt. Startup was born at Maidstone, in Kent, and arrived here over 53 years ago, when he bought the "Oaklands" property and lived there the remainder of his life. It may be truly said of him that his was no ordinary personality. In his early years here, he interested himself in everything for the good of the district, as a Justice of the Peace, member of the shire council and board of advice &c, and was also a supporter of the Church of England. He was the very soul of honour, and his given word was to him sacred in its observance. But for the retiring and unobtrusive nature of his disposition he would have been much more prominent in public and political life, but in this latter respect, as politics are nowadays he probably showed his wisdom and foresight in his silent observance of them. He also took a very lively interest in the sports of the young, especially cricket, at which in his young days he was an accomplished player, and only four years ago, when close on his 80<sup>th</sup> year, he was handling the bat with wonderful skill and vim on the Pakenham ground. His 80 years of life and service will live and reign long in the hearts of the people of this district, and though in body now lost to us, and gone to his reward full of years and honors, it may be truly said of him –

"His look of sympathy, his gentle word  
Spoken so low that only angels heard;  
The secret act of pure self-sacrifice  
Unseen by man but marked by angel eyes.  
These are not lost.

The funeral took place on Saturday last, in the Pakenham Cemetery, and was attended by a large and widely representative gathering of friends of the deceased and sympathisers with the widow and family in their great bereavement.

On Wednesday evening, December 13, an entertainment and coffee social was held in the Mechanics' in connexion with the anniversary of the Narre Warren Wesleyan church, the services having been held on the Sunday. The minister of the church, the Rev. H O. Oldmeadow occupied the chair, and, after an anthem by the choir, offered the opening prayer gave a short address. The following programme was then gone through:—

Song, "Sunshine and rain," Mrs. Woodley; song "The pardon came too late," Mr. Print; recitation, "Giving butter" Mr. A. Dobson; song, "Gates of the West" Miss Head; recitation, "The Cherrybeam" Mr. J. Oldmeadow; song, "Dear home land" Miss Hartley; song, "One hundred fathoms deep" Mr. Warby; recitation, "The lifeboat" Mr. Troup; Treasurer's report, Mr. Robt Kerr; address, Mr. T. Green; song, "The lifeboat crew" Mr. G. M. Greenwood; recitation, "The auction" Mr. P. Dixon; song, "Queen of my heart" Mr. Warby; song, "The Englishman" Mr. Chas. Dobson; duet, "Flow on thou smiling river," Misses Hill; recitation "The bridgekeepers story" Mr. Print; song "Sing sweet bird" Mrs. Woodley; duet, "Alls well" Mrs. Williams and Miss Williams; song "Charity" Mrs. Ward.

A comprehensive vote of thanks was proposed by Mr. A. Hill and seconded by Mr. R. H. Kerr, and carried by acclamation, after which the benediction was pronounced and tea, coffee, and ample provisions were served round. The attendance was good and most enjoyable evening was spent.

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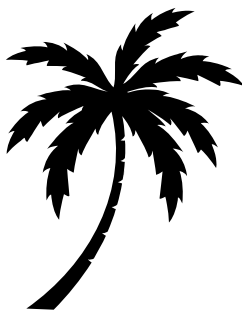
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
