We were treated to a wonderfully informative guest speaker in April when Tom Corfmat spoke to us about the role of the Victorian Volunteer Forces. Dressed in uniforms of the time, Corporal Tom Corfmat and his comrades Sergeant Major Geoff Gleadall and Bugler, Ian Douglas.

This group researches Victoria's Pre-Federation Volunteers 1854-1901. They are presently indexing all of the Muster Rolls of the volunteer

forces, which cover 30 units over around 40 years. They operate a living history group to recreate the Mt Alexander Rifles in the 1865 - 1895 period.

I know I gained some invaluable insight into one of my ancestors who served in the "Light Horse" for which I previously been unable to find any information. I now have some of my answers; he was part of Victoria's volunteer forces prior to enlisting in the Australian Imperial Forces and being shipped off to the First World War.

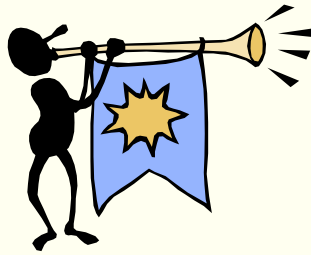

He remembered his grandmother talking about the Vivians so it is just possible that they were our family. Quite exciting.

It is the Autumn Festival in Bright and we thought it might be a bit busy and as a friend's nephew runs the caravan park at Tawonga we decided to stay there. We are going with friends so it should be a great time. If we have time we will go to Eskdale, near Little Snowy Creek, where Terry's dad had his first teaching position 80 odd years ago.

He was a man of inner dignity who despite a life of hard knocks rose above every setback. There is no index in this book but if you have ancestor's who lived in West Australia from the late 1890's you may find a name or place but you will certainly have a lot more admiration and respect for them and their environment, lifestyle and hardships.

This book was so interesting I read it from cover to cover in one go, I could not put it down.

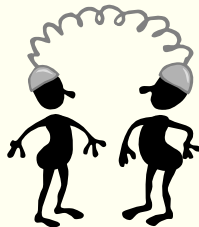

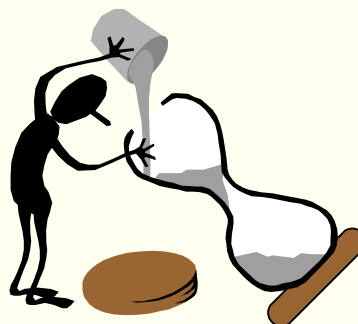
ACCESS POLICY

Revised policy effecting access to Victorian records

A revised Access Policy will come into effect in the second half of the year governing the access to records held by the Victorian Registry of Births, Deaths and Marriages.

The Access Policy 2007 defines:

- ⌚ who may be eligible to access Registry records
- ⌚ the conditions of access
- ⌚ the format in which information will be released
- ⌚ the period of time for which records are restricted.



One of the key changes to policy is that restriction periods on public access to birth and change of name records will increase from 75 to 100 years.

VicHeritage CD and microfiche products containing records that are in breach of the 100 year restriction period will no longer be available for purchase from the date of release of the Access Policy 2007. These products include the Edwardian Index, 1902 to 1913 (CD Rom and microfiche) and the Great War Index, 1914 to 1920 (CD Rom and microfiche).

The changes to the policy are driven by a number of factors including a need to better protect an individual's identity and an increase in life expectancy.

“Ultimately it is my responsibility as the Registrar to ensure all records held and released by the Registry are done so in accordance to strict standards that do not compromise an individual's security and personal identity,” said Ms Helen Trihas, Registrar, Victorian Registry of Births, Deaths and Marriages.

“We recognise and value the role we have in family and historical research and remain committed to supporting and working with all members of this community in their work,” she said.

Further information and the policy itself will be added to the Registry's website on release. www.bdm.vic.gov.au Information will also be passed onto various genealogical societies for dissemination as soon as it becomes available.

Just a Headstone Photo?

A friend was going to visit her family in Beechworth. She had just bought a digital camera. I casually asked “do you happen to know where the cemetery is in Beechworth?” Yes, she answered. I asked her if she would be able to take a photo of one of my ancestor’s graves while she was there. The last thing I wanted

her to do was spend a lot of time treading around this cemetery looking for my ancestor. I wasn’t even sure if she had a headstone.

So my friend left for her weekend in Beechworth and the most I expected was a digital photo of “Alice’s” grave when she got back. Of course it didn’t happen that way at all. My friend and her sister spent the entire weekend following up leads on the Porritt family. The instant the name was mentioned, locals in the town knew who she was talking about.

Before this fact finding mission to Beechworth all I knew was that my great grand aunt Alice SELICK (great grandfathers sister) was born in 1887 at South Melbourne. All of her siblings were born in South Australia and all but my great grandfather were married and had children there. So how did Alice end up in Beechworth?

We don’t have all the answers yet but the basic story is as follows.

Alice married John George PORRITT at the registry office in Adelaide 1907. They had three children Ethel Maude b. 1908, Thelma Josephine b. 1909 and John George b. 1913.

Their daughter Thelma’s second marriage was to Claude Rolland CAWTHRAY. At some time the couple moved to Beechworth and ran one the Empire Hotel.

Alice found herself living in Beechworth, at the local pub with her daughter and son-in-law. She moved there some time after 1947 when her husband died.

I am yet to find the connection to the Beechworth Porritt’s, who owned the local newspaper and at one time were said to be “the best dressed people in town”.

Of course there is a bit of scandal to this story too. I had an inquest that looked like it may be for Alice’s daughter, Thelma. Before now I had nothing to confirm this. I had nothing to confirm Thelma’s second marriage and of course she died with this married name.

Once my friend started to ask questions ‘round town people began telling a tale of a woman falling/ being pushed from the balcony of the Empire Hotel. Of course it was Alice’s daughter Thelma.

This is only the start of my search for long lost great grand aunt Alice, but what a start!

Pakenham Gazette

Friday, 14 Oct 1921

It is with great regret that we have to record the death of Mr. James Thewlis, of Pakenham, which took place on Tuesday last. The old gentleman, who was 68 years of age, had been ill for some time. He had been a resident of this district for about 11 years and was much respected by all sections of the community. His death will be regretted by many friends. The late Mr. Thewlis was born in Geelong, and practically the whole of his life was devoted to farming. He was a resident of the Longwood district for 30 years, and for the past 11 years has been engaged in farming in this district. He was an old member of the Independent Order of Rechabites, being associated for over 40 years. He was one of the pioneer members of the Mt. Eccles Tent which was formed in Geelong about 40 years ago. He had also been an active member and local preacher of the Methodist Church for many years. He leaves a widow, four daughters (Mrs. O. C. Williams, Mrs. R. Doherty, Mrs. F. G. Auhl, and Miss Grace Thewlis) and two sons (Messrs S. and F. Thewlis) to mourn their sad loss. They have the deep sympathy of many friends in their bereavement. The funeral took place yesterday afternoon the remains being interred in the *local cemetery. An impressive service was conducted at the graveside by Mr. J. W. Hill, of the Methodist church.

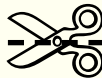

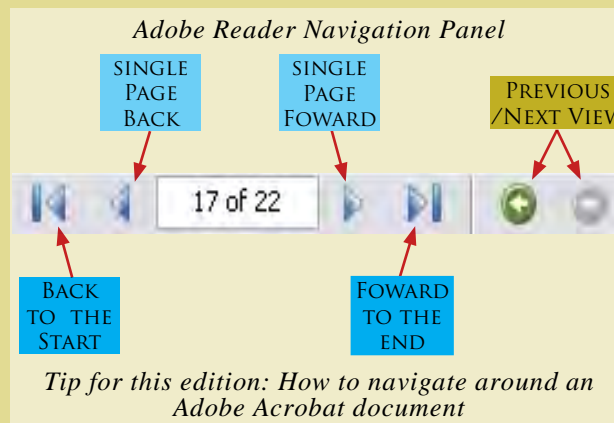
