
Valerie Holland - Our newest Life Member

I'd also like to again thank all our members who in any way have helped the group this year either doing duty, sizzling sausages, indexing or anything else.


Our Volunteers Morning

Narre Warren Library will be displaying the Public Records Office of Victoria (PROV) exhibition Lucy : a private life revealed through Public records in August. This exhibition documents the life of Lucy Bell from her arrival in Victoria, her marriages, the birth of her children, her struggle to obtain possession of her late husband's Estate and her own death. Lucy led a private life but this exhibition can retell her life because she used Government Services. Lucy's story, as presented in this Exhibition, draws on many commonly used PROV records, and may inspire you to create your own Lucy exhibition using the PROV resources relating to your own family members.

Our Journey From East To West On The Indian Pacific

A trip that we always wanted to do, turned into reality with us catching the Indian Pacific Train in Sydney bound for Perth, Western Australia.

We travelled in the Gold class carriages, which entitled us to our own little cabin with shower and toilet facilities. It was a great way to travel.

With the train creeping its way up through the Blue Mountains it was enthralling watching all the little towns pass us by. Then with the landscape changing into gentle hills and farmland we were in outback New South Wales. We crossed over the Darling River on the way to Broken Hill. We had a quick whistle stop tour of Broken Hill. The streets had little plaques describing the buildings of significant standing. On board again, on our way to Adelaide. With the countryside forever changing the time passed quickly.

We arrived in Adelaide and onto a bus for a tour around the capital city. It was again very informative and gave us both a different view on Adelaide.

We then started across the vast Nullarbor Plain. The countryside never changed much and was flat for as far as you could see. We saw camels, emu, a dingo and lots of wedge tailed eagles. Stopping at Cook, a remote town with a population of 4 people was another highlight. It gives you the feeling of a ghost town when you stroll through the old school and hospital buildings. They had a little shop with a captive audience.

Back on the train and on our way to Kalgoorlie. The highlight of Kalgoorlie had to be the huge open cut mine, the old architectural buildings and the biggest surprise to me was the two working brothels. They actually had the girls sitting in the windows. It was a real eye opener to me. Still not sure what I think about these. Anyway, back on the train and on our way to Perth. The land again was changing from desert to farmland, then to suburbs. Overall it was a great experience. The food was first class and sleeping on the train was a great event. Alighting in Perth we still had three days left of our package tour.

We had a night and day tour of Perth. We cruised down the Swan River and had an afternoon in Fremantle. Touring around Fremantle on the hop on, hop off trams was a quick way to see around.

We decided to hop off at the new Maritime Museum. To all genealogists who have ancestors who migrated

to W.A. this place is wonderful. At the entrance of the museum are “The Welcome Walls” an outstanding tribute to migrants who immigrated and arrived via sea through the Port of Fremantle. It has many, many names with the year of arrival and the boat they travelled on. They have a database at <http://welcomewalls.museum.wa.gov.au/>. This is searchable with a description of the person, sometimes a photo and other information. It is just a wonderful wall and a very fitting tribute to our forebears. Another highlight was a visit to the Swan Bells. A beautiful building on the Swan River with an Observation Deck, and 12 Carillon Bells housed in the Belfry. These bells were a gift to the people of Western Australia to commemorate Australia’s Bicentenary in 1988. The bells were cast between 1725 and 1770. We were able to watch the bellringers at work and hear the bells peal out across the town. We had arranged to meet with Rob’s second cousin once removed that I had discovered in Perth. We spent a very enjoyable day with them, exchanging family information and photos. It certainly has put more family on our tree. Just imagine our surprise when they told us they also had a son named Andrew and grandson called Will. It is unbelievable that we

have two with the same names. Thankfully they do have different second names. We will catch up with this branch of the family again.

Altogether we had a wonderful journey with many highlights. We have a beautiful country and hopefully we will get to see more of it.


